Cliff Camp July 2010

Our trip to Re States This year (2010) was planned so that we could be five (after 18 years) to get to Cliff Camp - always aware of the fact that Phil and his family come to Cliff Camp around the 4th of July. 18 years ago we were still at the old cabin with all of our children (Benjamin 17, Anna 15, Katherine 13, - Julian 10 years old.
