We had originally planned to come up on Thursday. However, snow and rain were predicted for Thursday and Friday. We arrived around 11am on Saturday to cool but clear conditions with snow still on the ground. Greg's super work crew was already unloading the new 420 gallon water storage tank which they laboriously hauled down the trail to the spring. Shortly Steve Derks arrived with over 800 lbs of lumber and other building materials in 10 bundles, most of them 2-man size. These materials were kitted to build a replacement outhouse, a new dining table, bed frame, shelving for the cabin and shed, and a shower stall. The entire crew struggled throughout the day to haul it all into the cabin. What a stalwart and cheery group. \textcircled

The Cabin had again been broken into. The front door was open and the latch side of the door broken off laying against the dining table. About 10 empty food boxes (e.g. Bisquick, oatmeal, corn meal, chips, & crackers) were neatly returned to the cabinets but otherwise the cabin was in pretty good order.

Saturday had a high of 64 and an overnight low of 33. Dinner for eight hungry men was tasty barbecued steak, pilaf, salad, and fruit.

Sunday, the crew installed the tank in a shady spot below the spring.

Initial filtering occurs in the reservoir. When it gets to the tank, large (>1/4 inch) items are deflected by a screen and smaller (i.e. sand) is collect in the stand pipe before entering the tank (through an insect proof screen). The top of the tank has a screened overflow outlet that allows the excess water to flush back down to the stream bed. The outlet has a gate valve that connects to the existing ³/₄ poly pipe to the cabin. This is a thing-of-beauty and should be a great solution to our water problems.

The spring was running very well but the pipe was plugged in several spots and had major leaks due to animal bites in two spots. It is important that we reroute the pipe in several areas and be sure it is buried to prevent this in the future in order to conserve the water we are trying to store. Such leaks are the only reason I can think of that might still cause water shortages this summer.

Once all plugs and leaks were cleared, the pressure at the cabin was so high that leaks developed that required tightening several joints. After all was done the static pressure was measured to be 76 psi and the flow rate was 78 gal/min.

Greg's team left for home as soon as the tank was filling.

Sunday, was about 5 degrees warmer. Dinner was Bratwurst, Red beans n' Rice, salad

Monday, Rick completed our shiny new outhouse. The old one had been shattered last fall by a falling tree and was pretty rickety.

Mike completed the new bed frame.

Monday, the weather was just as nice as Sunday. Showers all around. What joy!

Mike is a great worker and an eager helper.

Tuesday was mostly a day of rest. Mike had two special friends show up. First was a very noisy frog which we escorted outside. However, late Tuesday, Mike noticed that a very pretty hummingbird had taken up residence on his sleeping bag. When approached the hummer puffed up and made some hissing sounds but would not move and would not let go of the blanket even after we took the blanket outside. We finally had to pry its little feet loose using a tooth pick so that we could lay it outside overnight. It was gone the next day.
